



Call for Papers: Second Unquendor Tolkien Seminar Good and Evil in the Works of J.R.R. Tolkien

On 9 June, 1941, J.R.R. Tolkien wrote to his son Michael: "You have to understand the good in things, to detect the real evil". This pronouncement is as complex and enigmatic as the relationship between good and evil in Tolkien's fiction, where situations and people may not be what they seem at first glance. Tolkien's religion, experiences in World War I, and scholarly interest in Nordic heroism are just a few of the manifold factors that combined to shape Tolkien's perceptions of good and evil. It is the aim of this seminar to bring together scholars from various backgrounds and to explore the narrative as well as the theoretical aspects of this dichotomy in the works of J.R.R. Tolkien.
